

PCC Board of Trustees meeting report, August 21, 2019

### Hello:

In an effort to help our community stay informed about actions taken during governance meetings, I'm pleased to share a report from the most recent meeting of the Pasadena Area Community College District Board of Trustees.

 Kicking off an island-themed meeting intended to celebrate the end of summer, Board President James Osterling and Dr. Erika Endrijonas honored Trustee Anthony Fellow for his service as president of the board from December 2017 to July 2019.



- Leaders from Southern California Public Radio, including President & CEO Herb Scannell, Chief Operations
  Officer & CFO Elsa Luna, and President Emeritus Bill Davis, gave a presentation to the board on the media
  company's operations. As the partnership between the college and the station enters its 20th year, KPCC has the
  highest listenership among public radio stations in the greater Los Angeles area and is one of the top three
  stations in the nation.
- Board President Osterling made the following committee and representative appointments:
  - o Community College League of California representative: Linda Wah
  - Los Angeles County Committee on School District Organization representative: Sandra Chen Lau
  - Los Angeles County School Trustees' Association representative: Sandra Chen Lau
  - PCC Foundation representative: Hoyt Hilsman
  - Measure P Committee representative: John Martin
  - Facilities Master Plan Committee: John Martin (Chair), Berlinda Brown, Linda Wah
  - Accreditation/Board Policy Review Committee: Berlinda Brown (Chair), Anthony Fellow, Hoyt Hilsman,
     Student Trustee Alex Sarkissian
  - o Budget & Audit Committee: John Martin (Chair), Berlinda Brown, Sandra Chen Lau
  - KPCC Oversight Committee: Anthony Fellow (Chair), Hoyt Hilsman, Sandra Chen Lau



- Legislative Advocacy Committee: Hoyt Hilsman (Chair), Anthony Fellow, Linda Wah, Student Trustee Alex
   Sarkissian
- Students from a range of programs will take a five-day tour of historically black colleges and universities in the
  Atlanta area in October, thanks to action taken by the board. Thirty-two students in TRIO pre-college programs,
  A2MEND, EOP&S NextUp and the Transfer Center will visit Morehouse College, Spelman College, and Clark
  Atlanta University.
- The college will seek proposals for upgrades to its parking permit machines on the Colorado and Foothill campuses. The technology upgrade will enable faster processing and process improvements to the sale and display of parking permits, with an estimated investment of \$410,000 over the next five years.
- The board approved a renewal of a contract with the Chancellor's Office that allows the state to withhold funds due the college from students' tax returns, lottery winnings, or other state funding sources.
- Pay rates for hourly employees will increase to align with the City of Pasadena's minimum-wage ordinance. The board authorized an updated wage scale with a basement of \$14.25 per hour, up from \$12 per hour, for entrylevel hourly workers.
- The college will solicit proposals for coach bus and yellow bus services for student travel following action taken by the board at tonight's meeting.
- The board passed official resolutions establishing March 3, 2020, as the day that three trustee seats will stand for election: Area 2 (currently held by Board President Osterling), Area 4 (currently held by Trustee Hilsman), and Area 6 (currently held by Trustee Martin).
- With the books on the 2018-19 fiscal year officially closed, the college transferred surplus funds to the following accounts:
  - \$5.285 million to the Capital Facilities Fund
  - \$2 million to the college's post-employment benefit fund
  - \$1 million to the college's property and liability self-insurance fund
  - Roughly \$22,000 to improvements to the PCC Northwest site at John Muir High School
- The board approved a number of personnel actions:
  - Quinn Tang (director, Student Health Services), Nancy Chan (programmer analyst, Information Technology Services), Susan Nguyen (system administrator, Information Technology Services), and Rafael Saldana (shipping and receiving clerk, Office Services) joined the college's staff.
  - Krizia Rexha was named an interim clerk in the Health Sciences division. The board also approved title changes for three administrators: Robert Blizinski (to Assistant Superintendent/Vice President, Human Resources), Alex Boekelheide (to Special Assistant to the President), and Cynthia Olivo (to Assistant Superintendent/Vice President, Student Services).
  - The board approved the departures of five individuals from the college:
    - Ryan Mason, who was hired as an educational advisor in the Talent Search Program, has left the college;
    - Chuck Pomeroy, who has most recently worked as the assistant director for technical services in the Information Technology Services department, will retire Sept. 20 after 34 years of service to PCC;
    - Brandon Saller has left his post as an instructor in the Business, Engineering & Technology division;
    - Karyn Skiathitis retired from her position as a Health Sciences instructor after 7.5 years of service to the college; and
    - Nicholas Valsamides left the college after serving as an accountant in Fiscal Services.
- The meeting was adjourned in memory of two special members of the PCC community: Melquiades Mares, Jr., an educator, Navy veteran, PCC alumnus and scholarship donor, and father of Director of Student Equity Michaela Mares-Tamayo who passed away August 12, and Cheryl Cornelious-Ayala, a 20-year employee of the college who passed away last month.

Hello:

In an effort to help our community stay informed about actions taken during governance meetings, I'm pleased to share a report from the most recent meeting of the Pasadena Area Community College District Board of Trustees.

• It was the board's annual organizational meeting, in which the Trustees choose new leaders for the year to come. The board officers for the 2019-2020 academic year are:

o President: James A. Osterling

Vice President: Hoyt Hilsman

o Clerk: Berlinda Brown

Secretary: Erika Endrijonas, Ph.D.

- Alex Sarkissian was sworn in as the student trustee for the academic year.
- Board President Jim Osterling, in consultation with other Board members, appointed Trustees Martin, Brown, and himself Trustee Osterling to the Facilities Master Plan Subcommittee
- Board President Osterling is officially a candidate for the Association of Community College Trustees
   Nominations Committee following action taken by the board tonight.
- The college has the authority to make retroactive salary payments because of a resolution passed by the board relating to indefinite salary arrangements.
- The board lent its official support to four pieces of legislation under consideration in Sacramento. The bills are:
  - Assembly Bill 2, relating to the California College Promise program;
  - Assembly Bill 48, which recommends statewide bond programs for K-14 education be placed on ballots in 2020 and 2022;
  - Assembly Bill 1314, which would lower barriers to participation in the state's CalGrant financial aid program; and
  - Senate Bill 173, which would make it easier for students receiving federal workstudy funds to enroll in the CalFresh nutrition assistance program.
- The Board choose to pull agenda item H6 AB 1504-Student Representation Fee, for discussion at the next regularly scheduled Board meeting.
- It was the first meeting of the fiscal year, so the bulk of the board's actions related to approving standard umbrella authorizations for professional development, training, and other expenditures over the course of the year to come.
- The college is approved to become a member of local chambers of commerce and statewide education groups, as well as the American Bar Association, the California Community College Mental Health & Wellness Association, and the California Fashion Association. In all, the board approved membership in 120 organizations for the coming year.
- The board approved a number of personnel actions:
  - Louis Lopez (Commercial Music) joined the faculty in the Performing and Communication Arts division. Sharis Davoodi (interim director, Freeman Center for Career & Completion), Veronica De La Rosa (curriculum catalog technician), Adam Howard (assistant director, Enterprise Application Services), Jacqueline Javier (work-based learning program manager), Ryan Mason (Talent Search educational advisor), Ernesto Nery (assistant director, Financial Aid), and Bernice Rose (supervisor, Student Business Services) joined the classified staff.



- Starting July 18, Lynora Rogacs will serve as the new dean of the Visual Arts and Media Studies division. Eugene Chang (Purchasing Services), Marilyn Johnson (Information Technology Services), Tony Loc (Facilities Services), Sandra Parra (International Student Center), Rafael Saldana (Office Services), Linda Valencia (Facilities Services), Jessica Viray (Library), and Jonathan Wiggins (Facilities Services) will all be moving to new roles in the months ahead.
- o Rebecca Morris (Visual Arts and Media Studies) and Yvette Rosas (Counseling) will be on leave in the coming months. Monique Hedrick Walters has retired from the English division after more than six years of service to the college, and Vincent Whiting will be leaving his post in Facilities Services in mid-August after 26 years' service at PCC.

The meeting was adjourned in memory of Professor Gabriel Crespo, a noncredit ESL adjunct faculty member who recently passed away unexpectedly.

### C. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Mr. Alex Boekelheide will be reporting on behalf of Dr. Endrijonas, who is away at a conference in San Diego. It's an exciting time here at the college with commencement approaching.

He reported the state budget includes the PCC U building is back on the funding list. This is such great news, it means PCC will receive \$42 million to build a new science building under the proposed fiscal 2020 state budget. Mr. Boekelheide mentioned PCC officials want to move forward pretty quickly to save money on rising construction costs. The building could be ready for students as early as summer 2022.

Mr. Boekelheide reported that Dr. Kevin King from Huntington Medical Research Institute called PCC to get some students to work on his current project – living well with HIV.

The Board of Trustees approved the request to move \$300,000 from a restricted to an unrestricted account.

The athletic field is done and it looks spectacular, Mr. Boekelheide thanked the Foundation board and invited them to see the field.

2. Approval of Expenditures through April 1, 2019

### E. REPORTS AND PROJECTS

1. Board Development Report -

Ms. Mejia-Ramirez informed the committee that several individuals would be terming out this year, Dr. James Kossler, Dr. Ladd Thomas, and herself. She would like to recommend David Fields, Glenn Bowie and Mark Harmsen to join the board.

### 2. Finance Report -

Ms. Abram reported on behalf of Mr. Winter, the two commitments the Foundation has made to the college is: \$100K to the Promise Program and \$300K to Athletics for the field are still pending. Everything else regarding the budget is on target.

### 3. Campaign Report -

Ms. Pitzer spoke on behalf of Dr. Scott – the campaign is coming to an end, June 30<sup>th</sup>. The Foundation raised over \$16 million dollars. There are still some pending gifts. The next phase of the campaign is to steward the donors and ensure that the pledges are paid.

Ms. Peak announced a new software the Foundation is using called Graduway. It's an online networking community to engage PCC alumni. This will allow us to build an alumni acquisition program and reconnect with our alums.

### 4. Foundation President's Report

Mr. Hawkins said the college will most likely go out with a bond issue before the 2020 election. The college will heavily rely on the Foundation to be advocates to support the bond issue with the community. An ad hoc committee will be formed to support this issue. Mr. Jon Fuhrman will be the chair of that committee.

Mr. Hawkins recognized and acknowledged Ms. Sandi Mejia-Ramirez and Dr. Jim Kossler who will be terming out this year. He thanked them for all their hard work and their service to the college.

### 5. Executive Director's Report

Ms. Abram announced she met with the newly elected board members: Charmayne Ealy, Nancy Lan and Stephanie Lam for their board orientation.

During commencement, the Risser Award winners will be recognized: Marilyn Johnson and Bryan Gonzales.

Executive committee will not be meeting in July or August.

### **FINANCIAL OPERATIONS POLICIES**

Adopted June 20, 2007 Amended May 13, 2014

Proposed Updated Amendments August 1, 2019

*Note:* These policies have been adopted by the Pasadena City College Foundation Board of Directors (hereinafter, the "Board") as guidelines for managing the funds held at the PCC Foundation (the "Foundation"). All funds will adhere to these policies unless the fund was accepted prior to the adoption of these policies and if the governing documents of the fund have substantially different requirements contrary to the policies herein.

The Board reserves the right to make an exception from these policies on a case-by-case basis.

These policies and procedures may be superseded or modified at any time by the Board.

### I. Contributions

- a. Asset Types:
  - i. The Foundation will accept unrestricted contributions of property including: marketable securities, cash, life insurance policies and annuities. Subject to the review of the Board, the Foundation will also accept real property, private business holdings and restricted assets. The investment counsel has the authority to sell or hold gifts of stock as part of the financial portfolio as they deem fiscally appropriate.
  - ii. The Foundation will either sell or liquidate real property and other non-cash contributions, transferring the net proceeds from the sale to of the Foundation portfolio – or – as appropriate, transfer non-cash items (such as equipment or supplies) to the appropriate recipient/department at PCC.
- b. Terms and Conditions of Gifts

- Any restrictions shall be reviewed by the Board before the donation is accepted.
- ii. Where the terms and conditions specified by a potential donor are considered unachievable or in conflict with PCC policies, the Board shall meet with the donor to resolve the issues in question. If the terms and conditions applying to the proposed donation cannot be modified to meet the Foundation's concerns, the Board shall respectfully decline to accept the donation.
- iii. Funds must be for use only by or for programs of PCC.
- iv. The Foundation shall be knowledgeable of the source of a donation and its donor. For donations in excess of \$5,000, the Foundation will comply with the requirements of the US Patriot Act.
- iv.v. The Foundation reserves the right to restrict the use of its name in connection with the publication as a recipient of a gift.

### c. Classification of Donations (Accounting Definition)

As required by Financial Accounting Standards Nos. 116 (Accounting for contributions received and Contributions Made) and 117 (Efinancial Statements of Not-for-profit organizations), contributions accepted by the Foundation are to be classified into one of three accounting categories, namely:

UNRESTRICTED: Those net assets which represent the portion of expendable funds that are available to support the PCC Foundation's programs and operations. A portion of these net assets may be designated by the Board for specific purposes.

TEMPORARILY RESTRICTED: Those net assets which are donor-restricted for (a) support of specific programs and operating activities; (b) investment for a specified term; (c) use in a specified future period; or (d) acquisition of long-lived assets.

PERMANENTLY RESTRICTED: Those net assets and activities which are permanently donor-restricted for holdings of (a) assets donated with stipulations that they be used for a specified purpose, be preserved, or not be sold; or (c) assets donated with stipulations that they be invested to provide a permanent source of income.

d. Classification of Donations (Operating Definition)
 Unrestricted Funds (i.e., General Funds)

- The general fund supports specific programs of PCC and the PCC Foundation. This includes, but is not limited to grants, awards and program support to the College. The general fund also supports the operations and administration of the Foundation.
- 2. Board Designated Funds are unrestricted gifts that the Board has voted to limit for a specific purpose. (This will typically affect large, unrestricted gifts and bequests.)

### Temporarily Restricted Funds:

There are two types of temporarily restricted funds: (1) Short term projects, programs or special events with restrictions set by the donor; and (2) those funds that hold accumulated earnings on endowments. The following section refers to stand alone temporarily restricted funds and not to funds holding accumulated earnings on endowments.

- New Accounts: The initial minimum aggregate donations totaling \$10,000 are needed in order to establish a named account.
   Accounts less than \$10,000 may be set up with the approval of the Board.
- 2. Inactive or small accounts: Temporarily restricted funds that are less than \$500 and remain at or below \$500 for 12 consecutive months; or funds that have not activity for a period of 24 months must:
  - a. Be fully expended for the designated purpose within the following 12 month period, or
  - Have revenue added to the fund in order to keep it active;
  - If either of the above does not occur, the Foundation reserves the right to close out the fund and move the proceeds to a similar account (usually within the same academic department)
- 3. Restricted funds: Restricted funds set up for special events or grants will be closed 3 months after the event or grant period ends. Remaining funds will move into funds for related purposes or into the Foundation's general fund as appropriate.

Permanently Restricted Funds (Endowments)

- Permanently restricted endowments require an initial principal donation of at least \$25,000. All endowments should conform to general policies and procedures regarding investment composition, income allocation, and distributions as set by the Foundation unless otherwise approved by the Board.
- 2. Should it become impossible for the donor's original intent to be followed, the endowment fund will be re-designated to align as closely as possible with the donor's original intent. Every effort will be made to discuss any re-designation with the donor or heirs before implementation. All re-designations shall be approved by the Board.
- All "Net Investment Income" allocated to permanently restricted funds will be tracked in a corresponding temporarily restricted account.
- 4. Additional contributions that are made to a permanently restricted fund that individually amount to \$250 or less will be added to the temporarily restricted portion of the fund unless specifically restricted otherwise by the donor. (Example: If a faculty member chooses to make a donation to an already permanently restricted scholarship fund in order to increase the amount of a scholarship to be given away in the current fiscal year, the donation will be considered temporarily restricted and available for spending.)
- Additional contributions that are made to a permanently restricted fund that individually amount to \$250.01 or more will be added to the permanently restricted portion of the fund unless specifically restricted otherwise by the donor.

### Special Circumstances Funds:

Special circumstance assets that have been "grandfathered" into the Foundation, or those that have received Board approval for special treatment.

### II. Impractical, Wasteful or Unlawful Funds

Probate Code Section 18506(d) provides that the Foundation may, upon providing 60 days' notice to the Attorney General, release or modify a restriction on the management, investment or purpose of an institutional fund if the restriction is unlawful, impracticable, impossible to achieve or wasteful. As required by Probate Code Section 18506(d)(1-3), the funds must have a balance under \$100,000, more than 20 years have lapsed since these funds were

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established and the Foundation must continue to manage and use the funds in a manner that is consistent with the charitable purposes expressed in the gift instrument or governing documents of the fund.

H.III. Investment and Spending Policy

The Statement of Investment and Spending Policy has been defined in a separate document that is reviewed by the Finance and Investment Committee.

### **III.IV.** Income and Expense Allocations:

- a. On an annual basis, the Foundation reserves the right to institute a fund management fee, or to net operating expenses against investment income of the Foundation.
- b. "Net Investment Income" shall be allocated to each of the funds/projects as follows:
  - The following funds will participate 100% in Net Investment Income/Loss Allocation:
    - a. Class A Unrestricted Funds
    - b. Class D Permanently Restricted Funds (including related temporarily restricted accounts that track accumulated earning on permanently restricted funds)
    - c. Class E (previous Student Fund Association accounts)
  - 2. The following funds will participate 50% in Net Investment Income/Loss Allocation:
    - a. Class C Temporarily Restricted Funds with balances of \$10,000 or more at the end of the quarter.
  - 3. The following funds will NOT participate in the Net Investment Income/Loss Allocation:
    - a. Class B Temporarily Restricted Funds with balances of less than \$10,000 at the end of the quarter.
    - b. Class F Grants
    - c. Class G Funds receiving special allocations outside the normal investment guidelines
    - d. Class H Osher Funds. These funds will receive a special investment income.
    - e. Class X closed Funds
- c. "Investment Income" is defined as dividends, interest, realized gains/losses, unrealized gains/losses, and other immaterial income/expenses (e.g., cost basis adjustments, share splits, etc.)

- d. "Net Investment Income" consists of "Investment Income" less broker investment management fees.
- e. "Net Investment Income" shall be allocated on a quarterly basis based on the ending balance in each participating fund.
- f. "Pro-rata Share" is the balance of the participating fund divided by the total of all participating funds, multiplied by the participation percentage (i.e., 50% pro rata share, 100% pro rata share, etc.,) multiplied by the Net Investment Income.
- g. In any given period "Net Investment Income" may result in a Net Investment Loss. These losses will be distributed in the same manner as "Net Investment Income."
- h. Any fund that transfers over \$100,000 to another fund, or to a specialized investment pool, may receive, based on the discretion of the treasurer and subject to approval of the Board, a special net investment income allocation for the quarter in which the transfer occurs.

### IV.V. Distributions

The Foundation has the fiduciary responsibility of ensuring that restricted funds are used appropriately. Disbursement of funds may be denied if the Board and/or Foundation Executive Director have reason to believe that funds are being used inappropriately.

- a. Permanently Restricted Funds (endowments)
  - i. The Board will examine the overall return for the past 12 quarters, as well as the current and projected levels of cost inflation/deflation, to determine an over percentage that may be distributed from each fund during any given quarter/year.
  - ii. At its discretion, the Board may limit distributions on a fund-by-fund basis to mitigate: investment losses, inflation erosion, or excess distributions of the original principal amount.
- b. Temporarily Restricted Funds
  - Distributions will be made in accordance with the governing document.
  - i-ii. Funds created by or whose spending authority includes PCC faculty, staff or administrators whose purpose is to support a division or department of the college, or educational or professional development of a PCC employee, must include signature authorization of the current dean or vice president of the division or department. In the

case where the fund documents contain signature authority for a former dean or vice president that is no longer serving in their capacity, signature authority is deemed to have passed to the current dean or vice president or interim dean or interim vice president until such time as new signatures have been received.

- c. Unrestricted Funds (general funds)
  - At its discretion, the Board shall distribute monies from these funds to carry out the mission of the Foundation. All distributions will be made in accordance with the board-approved annual budget.
  - ii. All unbudgeted distributions equal to or exceeding \$1,000 from Unrestricted Funds shall be approved by the Executive Committee.
  - iii. For total annual distributions in excess of 5% of the fiscal year's beginning market value of the Unrestricted Funds investment portfolio, a two-thirds approval of the Board shall be required.
  - iv. The Executive Director may, at his or her discretion, approve single gifts of up to \$1,000 not to exceed an annual total of \$10,000 to program on campus from the general fund without prior approval from the Board. A listing of such gifts equal to or exceeding \$250 will be reported to the Executive Committee at the next scheduled Board meeting.
  - v. Programs receiving distributions from the Foundation including those receiving grants from the Foundation will be required to provide a timely report on how the funds were used and results/outcomes as a result of the grant. These report will be presented to the Board, upon request.
