Industry Sectors

• The following industry sectors are included in this report:

- ✓ <u>Advanced Manufacturing and Advanced Technology</u>
 - Considered a priority sector, PCC offers 13 certificates to train students for jobs in 62 occupations aligned with Advanced Manufacturing and Advanced Technology. Degree and certificate awards and employment rates have increased over the last couple of years.

✓ Advanced Transportation and Renewable Energy

• PCC offers several certificates that would prepare students for 18 related occupations in Advanced Transportation and Renewable Energy.

✓ Energy, Construction and Utilities

• An emerging sector, Energy, Construction and Utilities projected job openings over the next five years will equal 6,750. PCC programs in this sectors have seen growth in enrollment, employment and median wages.

✓ <u>Health Care</u>

 Health Care is the primary sector for middle-skill occupations. In the next five years, approximately 94,250 job openings will stem from this sector. Enrollment in health related programs consistently increased over the past five years.



Industry Sectors (continued)

✓ Information & Communication Technology/Digital Media

• ICT/Digital Media is PCC's largest industry sector with 10,406 enrolled students. Projected job openings for this emerging sector equals 9,400 over the next five years.

✓ <u>Business/Entrepreneurship</u>

• Business/Entrepreneurship has the most projected job openings than any other sector. Projected job openings over the next five years will equal 102,000; programs in this sector range from business management to early childhood education. Enrollment in this sector has steadily increased over the last five years, reaching 7,074 students in 2016-17. In fact, degree and certificates awards and transfers have increased as well.

✓ Life Sciences and Biotechnology

• California has the largest employment base in the country for Life Sciences/Biotechnology, yet only three community colleges in the LA/Orange County region offer certificates in Biotechnology and Biomedical Technology. In the last three years, PCC averaged more certificates than the other colleges (Citrus and LA Trade).

✓ <u>Retail</u>, <u>Hospitality</u> and <u>Tourism</u>

• Job growth in Retail/Hospitality/Tourism is strong yet wages are low compared to other sectors. Supervisors/managers yield higher wages in this industry. Retail is one of the industries that is vulnerable to automation. Nonetheless, forecasted job openings over the next five years equal 82,235.



Strong Workforce Metrics

- *Number of course enrollments:* The number of registrations in courses (may include duplicated students)
- *Number of students who got a degree or certificate:* Unique individuals who completed a credit or noncredit local certificate, credit or noncredit Chancellor's Office approved certificate, associate degree, or applied bachelor's degree
- *Number of students who transferred:* Unique individuals who transferred to a four-year institution
- *Employed in the second fiscal quarter after exit:* Employment rate for exiting students in the second fiscal quarter after leaving the community college system (based on a match to the state unemployment insurance wage file)
- *Employed in the fourth fiscal quarter after exit:* Employment rate for exiting students in the fourth fiscal quarter after leaving the community college system (based on a match to the state unemployment insurance wage file)



Strong Workforce Metrics

- Job closely related to field of study: The proportion of students who reported that their current job is close or very close to their field of study (based on responses in the CTE Outcomes Survey)
- *Median earnings in the second fiscal quarter after exit:* Earnings for exiting students in the second fiscal quarters after leaving the community college system (based on a match to the state unemployment insurance wage file)
- Median change in earnings: Percentage change in earnings for exiting students, one year before and one year after exiting the California community college system (based on a match to the state unemployment insurance wage file)
- Attained a living wage: Proportion of exiting completing and skills-builder students who attained the living wage for a single individual in the college's Doing What Matters region (based on a match to the state unemployment insurance wage file and Insight Center for Community Economic Development data)


Median Earnings in the Second Fiscal Quarter After Exit

Median Change in Earnings


