Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying Balance Sheet, Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Change in Fund Balance and Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Change in Fund Balance – Budget and Actual for the Measure P Bond Construction Fund of the Pasadena Area Community College District (the District) as of and for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2016, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's Measure P Bond Construction Fund financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, we consider internal control relevant to the District's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

NOTE 1: SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting Policies

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles as prescribed by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board and *Audits of State and Local Governmental Units* issued by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants.

Fund Structure

The Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Change in Fund Balance is a statement of financial activities of the Measure P Bond Construction Fund related to the current reporting period. Fund expenditures frequently include amounts for land, buildings, equipment, retirement of indebtedness, transfers to other funds, etc. Consequently, this statement does not purport to present the result of operations or the net income or loss for the period as would a statement of income for a profit-type organization.

Basis of Accounting

The Measure P Bond Construction Fund of the District is maintained on the modified accrual basis of accounting. As such, revenues are recognized when they become susceptible to accrual, which is to say, when they become both measurable and available to finance expenditures of the current period. Expenditures are recognized in the accounting period in which the liability is incurred (when goods are received or services rendered).

Cash in the County Treasury is recorded at cost, which approximates fair value.

<u>Budget</u>

The Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Change in Fund Balance – Budget and Actual includes a column titled "Budget". The amounts in this column represent the budget adopted by the Board and all amendments throughout the year.

Fund Balance Classification

The governmental fund financial statements present fund balance classifications that comprise a hierarchy based on the extent to which the District is bound to honor constraints on the specific purposes for which amounts can be spent. Amounts for which constraints have been placed on the use of the resources either (a) externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments, or (b) imposed by law through constitutional provisions or

enabling legislation are considered restricted. The fund balance of the Measure P Bond Construction Fund is therefore classified as restricted.

Capital Assets and Long-Term Debt

The accounting and reporting treatment applied to the capital assets and long-term liabilities associated with the Measure P Bond Construction Fund are determined by its measurement focus. The Fund is accounted for on a spending or "financial flow" measurement focus. This means that only current assets and current liabilities are generally included on the balance sheet. The reported fund balance is considered a measure of "available spendable resources". Thus, the capital assets and long-term liabilities associated with Measure P Bond Construction Fund are accounted for in the basic financial statements of the District.

<u>Estimates</u>

The preparation of the financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported in the financial statements and accompanying notes. Actual results may differ from those estimates.

NOTE 2: <u>DEPOSITS – CASH IN COUNTY TREASURY</u>

In accordance with Title 5 and the Budget and Accounting Manual, the District maintains all of its cash in the Los Angeles County Treasury as part of the common investment pool. These pooled funds are carried at unamortized cost which may differ from fair value. The fair market value is 100.1168% of the District's deposits for the Bond Construction Fund – Measure P Bond Program in this pool as of June 30, 2016.

The county is authorized to deposit cash and invest excess funds by California Government Code Sections 53534, 53601, 53635 and 53648. The county is restricted to invest in time deposits, U.S. government securities, state registered warrants, notes or bonds, State Treasurer's investment pool, bankers' acceptances, commercial paper, negotiable certificates of deposit, and repurchase or reverse repurchase agreements. The funds maintained by the county are either secured by federal depository insurance or are collateralized. The county investment pool is not required to be rated. Interest earned is deposited quarterly into participating funds. Any investment losses are proportionately shared by all funds in the pool.

The county investment pool is not registered as an investment company with the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) nor is it a SEC Rule 2a7-like pool. California Government Code

statutes and the County Board of Supervisors set forth the various investment policies that the Country Treasurer follow. The method used to determine the value of the participant's equity withdrawn is based on the book value, which is amortized cost, of the participant's percentage participation on the date of such withdrawals.

NOTE 3: EXCESS OF EXPENDITURES OVER APPROPRIATIONS

There were no excess of expenditures over appropriations, by major object account.

NOTE 4: <u>BONDED DEBT</u>

On March 5, 2002, the voters authorized the issuance and sale of general obligation bonds totaling \$150,000,000. The bonds were authorized to finance the construction, acquisition, furnishing and equipping District facilities.

Series A general obligation bonds were sold in June 2003, for \$33,000,000. The bonds were issued as Current Interest Bonds, and were fully redeemed as of June 30, 2014.

Series B and C general obligation bonds were sold in July 2006, for \$87,657,774. The bonds were issued as Current Interest Bonds in the aggregate principal amount of \$65,000,000 (Series B) and as Capital Appreciation Bonds in the aggregate principal amount of \$22,657,774 (Series C). Series C were fully redeemed as of June 30, 2015.

The bonds were issued to refund certain outstanding general obligation bonds (Series A Bonds) of the District and to pay for certain capital improvements.

The proceeds associated with the refunding were deposited in an escrow fund for future repayment. The bonds are considered in substance defeased and are not recorded on the financial statements.

Series D and E general obligation bonds were sold in September 2009, for \$52,000,000. Series D bonds are Current Interest Bonds with an aggregate principal amount of \$26,705,000 and Series E bonds are Build America Bonds with an aggregate principal amount of \$25,295,000.

NOTE 4: <u>BONDED DEBT</u>

The Series E bonds are designated as "Build America Bonds" under the provisions of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. With respect to the Series E bonds, the District expects to receive, on or about each bond payment date, a cash subsidy payment from the United States Treasury equal to the amount of interest determined at a federal tax credit rate under Section 54A(b)(3) of the tax code. The cash subsidy is deposited with the County and credited to the Bond Interest and Redemption Fund for debt service payments.

In April 2014, the District offered for sale \$16,980,000 in general obligation refunding bonds. The bonds were issued to refund certain outstanding general obligation bonds Series B of the District to pay for certain capital improvements. The bonds were issued as current interest bonds.

In May 2016, the District offered for sale \$33,995,000 in general obligation refunding bonds. The bonds were issued to refund certain outstanding general obligation bonds Series B and C of the District to pay for certain capital improvements. The bonds were issued as current interest bonds. The bonds contained an interest provision ranging from 2% to 5% depending on the maturity date of the bond. The refunding resulted in a cash flow savings of \$8,318,042. The present value of the economic gain to the District and taxpayers is \$7,157,913.

The proceeds associated with the 2014 and 2016 refundings were deposited in an escrow fund for future repayment. The refunded bonds are considered in substance defeased and are not recorded on the District's financial statements

Proceeds received in excess of debt are added to the maturity amount and amortized to interest expense over the life of the liability. The Series B, D, E, 2014 Refunding and 2016 Refunding bonds included a premium of \$1,965,547, \$1,839,608, \$1,742,478, \$2,608,686, and \$6,606,055, respectively, which are amortized using the straight-line method. Amortization of \$78,622, \$73,584, \$69,699, \$200,669 and \$68,814 was recognized during the 2015-16 year for Series B, D, E, 2014 Refunding and 2016 Refunding bonds, respectively. As a result of the 2016 Refunding, \$1,179,328 of the Series B premium and \$1,030,180 of the Series D premium was written off during the 2015-16 fiscal year.

The difference between the reacquisition price and the net carrying amount on refunded debt is deferred and amortized as a component of interest expense over the life of the new debt. Payments to the refunding escrow agent exceeded the existing carrying value of the refunded debt by \$2,722,250. Amortization of \$28,357 was recognized during the fiscal year 2015-16. Current year amortization of the deferred charge from the previous refunding was \$153,745. As a result of the 2016 Refunding, \$1,076,216 of the remaining deferred charge was written off during the 2015-16 fiscal year.

Purchase Commitments

As of June 30, 2016, the District was committed under various capital expenditure purchase agreements for construction and modernization projects totaling approximately \$921,500 to be funded through bond proceeds.

In the opinion of management, the ultimate disposition of any such matters will not have a material adverse effect on the District's Measure P Bond Construction Fund financial statements.

We have audited, in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the Balance Sheet, Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Change in Fund Balance and Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Change in Fund Balance – Budget and Actual for the Measure P Bond Construction Fund of the Pasadena Area Community College District (the District), as of and for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2016, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the District's Measure P Bond Construction Fund basic financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated November 14, 2016.

Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the District's internal control over the Measure P Bond Construction Fund financial reporting (internal control) to determine the audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency or a combination of deficiencies in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the financial statements will not be prevented or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies. Given these limitations, during our audit we did not identify any deficiencies in internal control that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, material weaknesses may exist that have not been identified.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the District's Measure P Bond Construction Fund financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of non-compliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

Purpose of this Report

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the District's internal control or on compliance. This report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the District's internal control and compliance. Accordingly, this communication is not suitable for any other purpose.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

We have conducted a performance audit of the Pasadena Area Community College District (the "District"), Measure P General Obligation Bond funds for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2016.

We conducted our performance audit in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain sufficient, appropriate evidence to provide a reasonable basis for our findings and conclusions based on our audit objectives. We believe that the evidence obtained provides a reasonable basis for our findings and conclusions based on our audit objectives.

Our audit was limited to the objectives listed on page 18 of this report which includes determining the District's compliance with the performance requirements for the Proposition 39 Measure P General Obligation Bonds under the applicable provisions of Section 1(b)(3)(C) of Article XIIIA of the California Constitution and Proposition 39 as they apply to the Bonds and the net proceeds thereof. Management is responsible for the District's compliance with those requirements.

Solely to assist us in planning and performing our performance audit, we obtained an understanding of the internal control of the District to determine if internal controls were adequate to help ensure the District's compliance with the requirements of Proposition 39, as specified by Section 1(b)(3)(C) of Article XIIIA of the California Constitution. Accordingly, we do not express any assurance on internal control.

The results of our tests indicated that, in all significant respects, the District expended Measure P General Obligation Bond funds for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2016, only for the specific projects developed by the District's Board of Trustees, and approved by the voters, in accordance with the requirements of Proposition 39, as specified by Section 1(b)(3)(C) of Article XIIIA of the California Constitution.

BACKGROUND INFORMATION

In November 2000 the voters of the State of California approved Proposition 39 authorizing the issuance of general obligation bonds by California public school district's and community colleges, under certain circumstances and subject to certain conditions. On March 5, 2002, a general obligation bond proposition (Measure P) of the Pasadena Area Community College District was approved by the voters of the District. Measure P authorized the District to issue up to \$150,000,000 of general obligation bonds to finance various capital projects, and related costs, as specified in the bond measure provisions of Measure P.

Pursuant to the requirements of Proposition 39, and related state legislation, the Board of Trustees of the District established a Citizens' Oversight Committee and appointed its members. The principal purpose of the Citizens' Oversight Committee, as set out in state law, is to inform the public as to the expenditures of the proceeds of the bonds issued pursuant to the Measure P bond authorization. The Citizens' Oversight Committee is required to issue at least one report annually as to its activities and findings.

Section 1(b)(3)(C) of Article XIIIA of the California Constitution requires the District to conduct an annual independent performance audit to ensure that the proceeds of the bonds deposited into the Measure P Bond Construction Fund have been expended only for the authorized bond projects.

OBJECTIVES

The objectives of our Performance Audit were to:

- Determine the expenditures charged to the District Measure P Bond Construction Fund.
- Determine whether expenditures charged to the Measure P Bond Construction Fund have been made in accordance with the bond project list approved by the voters through the approval of Measure P on March 5, 2002.
- Provide the District Board of Trustee and the Citizens' Oversight Committee with a performance audit as required under the requirements of the California Constitution and Proposition 39.

SCOPE OF THE AUDIT

The scope of our Performance Audit covered the fiscal period from July 1, 2015 to June 30, 2016. The sample of expenditures tested included object and project codes associated with the bond projects. The propriety of expenditures for capital projects and maintenance projects funded through other state or local funding sources, other than the proceeds of the bonds, were not included within the scope of our audit. Expenditures incurred subsequent to June 30, 2016, were not reviewed or included within the scope of our audit or in this report.

PROCEDURES PERFORMED

We obtained the general ledger and the project expenditure reports prepared by the District for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2016, for the Measure P Bond Construction Fund. We also reviewed documentation, including the District website, for compliance with California Education Code Sections 15264 and 15272 – 15286. Within the fiscal year audited, we obtained the actual invoices and other supporting documentation for expenditures to ensure compliance with the requirements of Proposition 39 and Measure P with regards to the approved bond projects list. We performed the following procedures:

- We reviewed the projects listed to be funded with general obligation bond proceeds as set out in the Measure P election documents.
- We selected a sample of expenditures for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2016, and reviewed supporting documentation to ensure that such funds were properly expended on the authorized bond projects. The District expended \$3,812,822 of Measure P funds for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2016. We selected a sample of expenditures totaling \$2,894,052 which is 75.90% of expenditures.
- We verified on a sample basis that funds from the Measure P Bond Construction Fund were expended on the authorized bond projects and not used for salaries of school administrators or other operating expenses of the District.

CONCLUSION

The results of our tests indicated that, in all significant respects, the District has properly accounted for the expenditures of the funds held in the Measure P Bond Building Fund and that such expenditures were made on authorized bond projects and not expended for salaries of school administrators or other operating expenditures.
